


Marching To The Freedom Dream illustrates three pivotal marches of the Civil Rights Movements: the 1958 Youth March for Integrated Schools, organized by Bayard Rustin, Dr. King, and Harry Belafonte; the 1963 March on Washington, D.C. for Jobs and Freedom, where Dr. King delivered the iconic 'I Have a Dream' speech; and the 1965 Selma to Montgomery March for Voting Rights, where 1000s of people marched 54 miles through segregated Alabama.

Through his images and narrative, Dan Budnik presents the vision and peaceful intention of the leaders of the civil rights movement, not by overwhelming us with sights of violence or hatred, but with a view into the lives of the leaders, the marchers, and their communities.
